

Open world markets give SMEs a chance to grow

On our conference on SMEs & WTO organised by the SME-Union, SME-Global and the European Enterprise Institute on 19 June 2003, we stated, that the WTO must not only take into account the broad classification of developed, developing and least developed countries. It should also consider the strength and diversity of SMEs from all over the world. SMEs are by definition dynamic and have been able to react to new market openings quickly. However, SMEs in both the developed and the developing worlds are faced with the same challenges and obstacles to international trade. Removing these obstacles by creating an equally open and liberalised global market, not only gives SMEs the chance to grow, but also creates a level playing field across the world.

The purpose of our SME & WTO conference was to raise aware-

creating winning market conditions

of the impulse generators.

The failure of Cancun has shown that economic developments in this world are not predictable at all and that Europe needs to continue agitating for our aims by our joint efforts to shape the legal and economic framework promoting free trade and fair competition.

As former President of the European Commission I know exactly about the efforts made by the European Union in order to promote international trade and to encourage exports by small and medium enterprises. I would like to mention the various initiatives the European Commission has taken and actions that have been implemented for their support. Unless appropriate attention is accorded to SMEs, the so-called Lisbon strategy would remain an empty phrase devoid of substance. Underlining the socio-economic role of SMEs, they are -amongst other thingsthe vehicles for the combating of unemployment, for economic progress and for keener competitiveness. Tax Reform Concept 2004 - 2006



Ministry of Finance of the Slovak Republic, Mr. Ivan Miklos, prepared a comprehensive tax reform proposal, which includes the changes in all

taxes valid in the Slovak Republic. Tax reform proposal was approved by the Government of the Slovak Republic June 5, 2003.

Currently Ministry of Finance is dealing with the preparation of the tax laws related to the approved Tax Reform Concept so that the new tax laws and the amendments of the tax laws respectively could be submitted for the legislative process in the line with the attached timetable in the Annex 1.

The main goals of the tax reform are as follows:

- To eliminate the existing weaknesses and deformations in the tax laws as much as possible
- To tax all types and all amounts of income equally and thus to achieve the highest possible degree of fairness
- Direct taxation will be completely neutral and simple and will represent a strictly fiscal under-
- To switch tax burden from direct taxes to indirect taxes
- To create business and investment friendly environment for individuals and companies as well

The tax reform proposal is based on these principles:

- Neutrality
- Simplicity
- Effectiveness Fairness

The taxation of profit, property and consumption were defined as the most appropriate objects for taxation.

Planned changes in personal income tax and in corporate income tax

Tax reform includes an introduction of flat rate for income taxation. It means that incomes of all subjects (individuals, legal entities, foreign individuals and entities and other entities) will be taxed at one linear 19% tax rate. Tax reform in the field of income taxation abolishes many exemptions, tax reliefs and special tax bases and rates (f. e. including lump sum tax) in order to simplify the Income Tax Act as much as possible.

Ministry of Finance is concurrently working on Income Tax Act draft that will be prepared in line with proposed tax reform in the field of income taxation. New Income Tax Act will enter into force January 1,

New Income Tax Act draft includes significant changes as follows:

- Basic tax allowance per taxpayer will increase to SKK 80 832 (19,2 times living min.) from SKK 38 760
- Child allowance deductible from tax base (SKK 16 800) will be replaced by tax bonus deductible from tax (SKK 421 monthly, SKK 5052 yearly)
- Spouse allowance will increase from SKK 12 000 to SKK 80 832 In the field of corporate income tax there are proposed the changes that should improve business and investment environment in the Slovak Republic, f. e. changes in the depreciation policy, tax loss carry forward and changes in the tax deductible items.

Planned changes in value added tax

Tax reform includes a unification of the lower (reduced) VAT rate (current 14%) and higher (standard) VAT tax rate (current 20%) and an introduction of one VAT rate with the effect from January 1, 2004. The government agreed on one unified VAT rate at 19%. The group of goods and services taxed at current reduced VAT rate includes, for example, basic food, medicaments, energy, construction works, books, newspapers, magazines or hotel and restaurant services.

With the effect from May 2004 it is proposed to lower the threshold for VAT registration pursuant to the EU requirements from the current SKK 3 million to SKK 1.5 million (EUR 35 000) annual turnover.

Planned changes in excise duties

The changes proposed in the tax reform in the field of excise duties are in compliance with the EU directives. Tax reform proposal includes these significant changes:

- Excise duty on beer the cabinet passed the proposal to raise excise duties from July 2003, submitted by the Finance Ministry. Excise duty on beer should go up from the current SKK 30 (0.75 EUR)/°Plato/hl to SKK 50 (1,20 EUR)/°Plato/hl.
- Excise duty on wine tax rates for excise duty on wine (still wine as well as sparkling wine) remain unchanged
- Excise duty on tobacco and tobacco products - proposal to increase tax rate for cigarettes from SKK 0,95 to SKK 1,40, tobacco and tobacco residue should be taxed at excise duty of SKK 1,350 per kilogram from July. Currently, one kilogram of tobacco residue is taxed at SKK 880 and tobacco at SKK 1,000.

Planned changes in other taxes

Tax reform proposes to abolish the following taxes: gift tax, inheritance tax, and real estate transfer tax. Real estate transfer tax. gift tax and inheritance tax present multiple taxation of the property that was already taxed once. Another relevant reason to abolish these taxes is the especially low revenue they generate (gift tax accounts for 0.9% and inheritance tax for 0.6% of total tax revenue), which thus represents a breach of the principle of effectiveness. Short-term and middle-term tax measures are proposed in the field of real estate tax. Middleterm measures include an intro-

duction of value principle. All real

estate, i.e. lands and constructions, will be taxed under the value principle. This means that the value of real estate is determined according to uniform rules and a percentual amount of tax is calculated from this value. Shortterm measures in the field of real estate tax with the effect from January 1, 2004 includes the changes in the coefficients.

In the field of tax on motor vehicles - proposed changes are in compliance with EU directive No. 99/62/EEC and Directive No. 92/106/EEC. The Ministry of Finance prepared the proposal of the law on tax on motor vehicles, which includes the taxation of utility vehicles only (the passenger cars and buses are not taxed). This proposal was approved by the Council of the Finance Minister and will be submitted for further legislative procedures. The law on tax on motor vehicles should enter into force January 1, 2004.

Fiscal impacts

Ministry of Finance paid special attention to fiscal impact quantifications because of great importance of tax reform and its impacts on state budget with special regard to fulfilment of Maastrich criteria (deficit must not exceed 3% of GDP in 2006). The calculations were made independently by several institutions, including International Monetary Fund, Financial Policy Institute at the Ministry of Finance, special committee created at the level of minister of finance, Infostat, Slovak academy of sciences -Institute for Slovak and international economy.

Fiscal impacts of the chosen combination of the tax rates (flat tax and single VAT rate at 19 %) and proposed changes in other taxes are attached in Annex 2. Planned deficit for 2004 with taking into account planned measures in the tax policy in line with the Tax Reform proposal is 3,9 % of GDP.

Global SMEs demand Transparency, Flexibility, Access



The needs of SMEs before Cancun. It is with the small and medium-sized enterprises where commerce starts, if we help them to develop in a more open international environment, we will encourage significant progress in the fields of global trade. The WTO must not only take into account the broad classification of Developed, Developing and Least Developed countries; they should also consider the strength and diversity of SMEs from all over the world. Speaking at SMEs & WTO conference organised by SME-Union, SME-Global and the European Enterprise Institute, Dr Paul Rübig MEP stated: SMEs are, on the whole, dynamic and have to date, been able to react to new market openings quickly. However, SMEs in both the Developed and the Developing Worlds are faced with the same challenges and obstacles to international trade. Remove these obstacles by creating an equally open and liberalized global market, and you not only give SMEs the chance to grow, but you create a level playing field across the world.

Key to Dr Rubig's message was the establishment of an international 'Trade Facilitation Database' "My suggestion to this conference is that the first step in overcoming such problems can be achieved through the establishment of an exhaustive database - the 'Trade Facilitation Database', containing information on all these aspects, which is available on the Internet for use by SMEs from all over the world. Just imagine what a difference this will make to SMEs - they will have the knowledge and understanding of world markets and will be given the commercial confidence to enter new markets. Only this mechanism will ensure that trade facilitation is a reality, not just for the multinationals, but for SMEs as

Only with the use of such an important and accurate tool can we create a transparent, flexible and accessible world trade system.

The purpose of the conference was to raise awareness amongst the key decision-makers, the politicians and most importantly the negotiators in Cancun, that the Doha Development Round cannot be a DEVELOPMENT round without creating a level playing field all of the economic generators. As a starting point the conference pursued some of the questions of the role and future for SMEs in the global market. It then moved to provoke and analyse how SMEs are to achieve these objectives through the Doha development round.

The conference was attended by, amongst others: European Commissioner for Trade, Pascal Lamy; Director of Mexican Ministry of Economy, Luz Maria de la Mora; Minister-Counsellor for Economic Affairs - Embassy of China, Xuzhong YU; Director of Enterprise Policy UEAPME, Luc Hendricks; Deputy Chief of Mission - Embassy of India, R. P. Agrawal; President of Euro Commerce, Peter Bernert; EP Delegation Member to Cancun, Konrad Schwaiger.

SME - Global Visit to Mexico City

On 8 September 2003, the first meeting within the SME-Global visit to Mexico took place, when Mr. Dorn and Mr. Fehlinger met the heads of the international department and the head of the policy department of the Mexican Federation of Employers (Coparmex). For the SME-Union the meeting went very well. The hosts remarked, that the level of European investment in Mexico still does not match the expectations of both sides, three years after the free trade agreement was signed. One of the reasons is the stalemate in the Mexican Congress, which has led to the postponement of major reforms. In Mexico, a fiscal reform is thus still on the agenda. Even though the Mexican economy has rebound impressively from the tequila shock of 1995 the last three years have brought almost no growth. However the reforms of Vincente Fox resulted in a lot of good for the country. Although NAFTA is benefiting Mexico in many ways, due to the lack of any political dimension, progress in vital areas, such as competition

policies, liberalisation, privatisation, and fiscal and financial reform is lagging behind. This is just another indication for the need for a common agenda for transition countries such as Mexico, similar to that for the EU candidate countries in order to transform their institutions and to benefit from globalisation.

SME - Global Lunch in Cancun

On 10 September the SME-Global, the SME platform of the

IDU has organised a lunch together with the EPP/ED group on the occasion of the opening of the WTO Ministerial Conference. The lunch was attended by over 30 political and business representatives from all around the world. For the European Council, the Austrian Minister for Economic Affairs Mr. Martin Bartenstein gave a strong speech against protectionism. In this, he was applauded by the Vice President of the EEP/ED group Mr. van Velzen who presented the EPP/ED group's policies on trade matters. Mexico was represented by 4 members of the Senate from the PAN party. Its leader, the President of Mexico Vincente Fox, had opened the WTO Conference in a magnificent way the same day. The debate was dominated by the Singapore issues versus farm trade, as Mexico is member of the G20 GROUP, which is pushing hard for the open of the farm trade of the rich worlds markets.

On Monday evening Dr. Paul Ruebig, President of SME-Global chaired a dinner hosted by the Austrian Trade Commissioner to Mexico, Mr. Franz Dorn. The dinner was a great success. A much tighter coordination between Mexico and the EU and their respective party structures was agreed upon. The PAN representatives were also very keen to participate in the SME Global. Thanks all our friends who have supported this project.

Cancun Press Conference

The SME-Global has held a successful Press Conference on Friday the 12 September in Cancun. Mr. Ruebig, MEP, invited Mr. Sturdy from the UK to

Cancun WTO Round failed

The WTO round in Cancun failed on Sunday the 14th and that day should be marked as a major defeat for SMEs all around the world. The agro-



protectionist of the West and the socialistic market enemies of the South have managed to make the worst out of a great opportunity. Maybe it could have been expected that the EU and the US will not annoy their farmers just before the US Presidential and the EP elections. On the same token communist China, hyper protectionist India and a new Brazilian President who thinks he is the reincarnation of Che Guevara do not form a credible pro trade coalition. Let us see if tempers cool in the next year in a more temperate setting then Cancun when some might realize the dimension of their almost criminal neglect. Still a positive sign can be spotted as the agro-protectionist have come under enormous pressure from the NGO side which for the first time argued for open trade and that is quite something. That competition policy is a hard sell to post colonialist and not totally post socialistic developing countries is quite clear but at least maybe that might make some of these leaders think that competition authorities are part of the normal set of regulatory institutions that market based democracies normally have. Maybe the Cancun shock will lead to something in the end.



SME visit to Washington:

to Washington had the aim of structuring the cooperation projects, which have been discussed during the high level visit of last July. All the details please see at www.sme-union.org. The focus (and it is important to have one - as every European visitor in the US learns pretty soon) was to discuss the US involvement in the SME platform of the IDU www.idu.org - with the working title SME-Global. The idea is to create a network of leading centre-right wing politicians who are working on Small Business issues in their respective political systems.

The initiative of the SME-Union was positively received on the US side, especially by Senator Christopher Bond of Missouri http://bond.senate.gov/ who has worked extremely successfully in order to create the legal framework for the Small Business miracle of the US. Low taxation, simple legislation, respect for property and a mentality in the whole society which supports risk takers and awards entrepreneurship have been preconditions for the recent boom. http://www.sba.gov Senator Bond assured the SME-Union representative of his support for the project. The concrete implementation will depend on the availability of leading US Congress members of the Republican Party to one of the meeting of SME-Global. The first will take place during our election congress in Brussels on the 26/27 of March and the 2nd one during the next WTO ministerial round planned for 10th to 14th of September 2003 in Cancun, Mexico.

The main obstacle is that the RNC - the Republican National Committee - the national organization of the Republican Party has no organized international affairs department. Foreign policy is seen as a reserve in the trian-

Pentagon and the staff of the NSA in the White House. Obviously these institutions are interested in intergovernmental relations and not in parties in opposition or something like conservative inter-party relations for politicians working on SME issues. Without a full-time contact person in the RNC you have to fight your way up the hierarchy of the RNC and we have been really lucky that we found some really open minded people in the staff of Co-Chair Ann Wagner who have supported us since then.

We hope for the establishment of an international office in order to ease the future transatlantic cooperation.

Report about the SME visit to Washington

The SG of the SME-Union visited after the Cancun WTO conference Washington in order to present the new projects launched in the last months and to foster transatlantic SME links. One of the aims of the visit is to organise the next SME delegation to Washington, which is planned after the EP elections.

The US is already committing huge sums to develop Iraq and in many ways is carrying the main burden for the industrialisation of China by allowing them market access in a broad area of industries. It will some day be called by historians the biggest and probably most successful development project in human history and it is essentially positive but the scale of change in concerned sectors is so fast that a political backslash against it can only be avoided by very firm beliefs and leadership. The Chairman is providing both but something definitely will have to change in this area. For the Chairman trade relation with Europe seem to be vital now for SMEs because the truth of the matter is that market access for US Small Business in Europe is of course much easier than in China or somewhere else. Mr. Manzullo was very positive towards the potential cooperation between us and so let us hopes for the best. As the chairman of the Small Business and Entrepreneurship committee of the House Mr. Manzullo has done great things for US small business especially when you think about the tax code or

regulatory reform projects undertaken regularly on the initiative of the Small Business Committee. The mere fact that the House and the Senate do have such committees vested with the full power of other committees to question, pressure and push the Administration and its various agencies of economic policy making is a clear signal how different the US and the EU culture is in this area. Maybe we can succeed in convincing the EP to set up such a committee after 2004 but given the mentality of anti-SME policy it is not really likely. It is a pity though.

Wednesday ATR Breakfast

If you read THE ECONOMIST you will probably have heard of the Wednesday breakfast meeting of the Americans for tax reform. This is the key organising tool for Groover Nordquist, which he started some years ago and which today seems to be the key-networking event in conservative America. Mr. Nordquist assembly broad coalitions of different conservative groups and steers a colourful mixture of local, federal and international activist for one and a half hours through the morning from 10.00 to 11.30. The spectre goes from African ministers in town to catholic Priests returning from Iraq to state attorneys from the mid west to Washington lobbyist and GOP staff from the hill or RNC. Of course the whole of the think tank community is there as well as writer and columnist from all shades. The ECONOMIST called this meeting probably the pumping heart of what Hillary Clinton has termed so famously

a vast right wing conspiracy against her husband. A quote, which is proudly, uses an advertisement today for the main organ of the

Standard", which just this week covered with "Against United Europe". And here there is the only aspect, which is troublesome because these people are in no way extreme right wing neither in the UK, US, nor Continental use of this term. These are antitax reformers and missionaries of liberty but in no way anti-immigrations or anti foreigner or racist. In fact the whole idea of Mr. Nordquist is to reduce public expenses to its necessary level and in no way some imperialist movement. In fact Mr. Nordquist runs an outfit called Islamic Institute on the same premises like the ATR and the basic idea is the idea of nonintervention in private choices in politics, consumption and belief. For the obvious differences in cultural terms between the US and the EU please see my articles on www.eei-net.org One more than obvious difference is that the US has a conservative movement which is well organised ready to deliver an ideological platform for the leadership of the West based on openness and opportunities. That is not the case in Europe. But a new consent in the direction is emerging. Today market liberals and euro federalist, Christian democrats and conservatives are trying to overcome the European dividing lines in the gig issues of economic reform and the future of Europe. Of course the temporary shift of German foreign policy allowed the French for pose as "Europe" because of the fixation with nation states and their capitals in Washington which has ignored the last 10 years of accelerated EU integration mainly because Clinton has ignored most of the world development till the blow in his face and the conservative movement was so fixated in fighting Clinton that most of the intellectual energy went in this direction and to prepare for anew form of government in the post Clinton times. EU watching played no role here. Is there now a real danger of an alignment of a minority of euro sceptic with the mainstream conservative movement of the USA, which with all probability will hold most of the US government institutions in the next decade? In a way it can be argued that Mr. Chiarc could be the matchmaker of this alliance but nobody with his full senses can hope for that and it is also quite unlikely. The mainstream in Washington still is in favour of European unity and even if there is some scare mongering of some libertarians with the Charter of fundamental rights and the EU constitution most listen interested but disregard it as unbased. But doubtless it constitutes the biggest structural danger for the EU since its foundation. The US was from the beginning the silent partner of the EU integration. Some kind of elder brother or silent investor. Without the clout and weight of the US the fundamental difference in interest and the eternal jealousness of Britain, France and Germany will tear Europe into warring faction, as it has done for a 1000 years to now. Everybody who knows the names of Monnet, Adenauer, Schuman and McCloy,



SME visit to Washington:

Acheson and Dulles should be worried like hell. It is not the French and German 'no' to the war it is the potential shift in support for EU integration of the US, which constitutes the real danger for the EU. And ironically not because the US will actively ever work against the EU but because without the USA as active player in favour of the integration the centrifugal forces of the EU itself will tear it apart. And as well all know how much the citizens and the SMEs of Europe have benefited from the integration process we have to work hard to avoid the enemies of Europe, to convince the US to disown its own child.

Meeting with Groover Norquist ATR

The meeting with Grover Nordquist was definitely one of the highlights of this visit to Washington. Mr. Nordquist is something like the unofficial leader of the conservative movement of Washington. He was instrumental to make sure that the momentum behind the tax cut movement did not stall due to programmatic pressure and vested interest once Mr. Bush was elected President of the USA. In fact in 3 years not less than 3 major tax cuts have been implemented and the 4 one is on its way already. What a difference to Europe. Not the mention the 15 percentage points which divide us already from the US. Doubtless leaders like Mr. Nordquist had quite some influence that this Bush administration will not go down as his fathers but will have the full support of the whole spectre of the conservative movement of the USA and it is up to people like Mr. Nordquist that this movement is at its height today. Whatever the outcome of the elections in 2004 will be it will not be the conservatives leaving Bush this time. The general outlook which Mr. Nordquist gives looks quite good for the Republican Party and its election prospects due to mega trends in the US society leading to more individualism and less support for state organised initiatives favoured by the Democratic Party. Indeed the support base of the Democrats is eroding mean it the unions or the big city political machines. Trail lawyers are a special target of Mr. Nordguist and the legal framework supporting them is one of the main targets after the next elections. Indeed also among ethnic or religious groups of voters like Latinos or Moslems the conservative ideas have a lot of resonance as can be proven by about two thirds of Washington taxi drivers of Moslem belief who support the President on Iraq and tax issues. Definitely a leader like Mr. Nordquist is missing in the conservative camp in Europe and is urgently needed as the high tax levels in Europe prove so painfully. We were also looking for statistical material for the positive effect of the Bush tax cuts on the US economy, which in fact are allowing the US economy already considerable higher growth rates than we have in Europe. The old axioms of the SG of the SME-Union that the US and EU have the recession in the same year but the upswing of the economy start three year later is proving right again and will lead us again to fall even further behind the US. Lisbon may come and go but at the end of the day economic dynamism in a modern economy boils down to the level of taxation as the most important indicator.

Another really interesting factor is the connection between the Bush tax cuts and SMEs. It is often argued from the left that

the Bush tax cuts do favour only the rich. Indeed some statistic seems to indicate some truth behind that. The reality is that most SMEs in the US are registed as private chapters under the US tax code and therefore the personal rate of income applies on their revenues. So whenever they may seem rich persons in some statistics they still have to carry huge costs alongside their revenues and therefore these statistics are misleading to the extreme. The tax cuts of President Bush have benefited most these smaller personal entre-preneurs and

risk takers who are the main target group of the Republicans because they are not the wealthy elite but the imitative young dynamic segment of the US society, which really tries to move things and create jobs and wealth.

There is the project of some US lawmaker coming to Brussels and Paris for the 2004 jubilee of the



D-Day landing in Normandy and that could be a very good networking opportunity.

Meeting with TABD Jeffrey Werner

The SME SG had also the chance to meet the point man of the Transatlantic Business Dialogue a joint US EU initiative, which since almost 10 years brings together leaders of various major European and American companies with political leaders from both sides. The success of the integration of the two markets is enormous.



The last decade has been the decade of most major companies of both sides of the Atlantic developing into important players on both sides of the ocean. That is excellent

because it helped our continent to grow together and benefit consumers from both sides. But given that success story we think that it is now time for SMEs to follow suit. The progress of the telecom-munication and the internet together with the logistic allow now also smaller comp0anies to benefit from the same economies of scale than multinationals if the legal framework is in place to help them. Indeed that is what it is all about. SMEs can only develop into transatlantic players if there is absolute legal clarity and shipping, and payment is no more different between Seattle and Wisconsin than with Texas to Austria. Especially as SMEs do not have the legal department to fight for them, they need more help from politics and institutions like TABD. Therefore we advise to strengthen the role of SMEs in the TABD and allow them to have the lead in that framework because companies as Siemens have opened their Washington

offices already and as they now employ tens of thousand of people in the US and the EU the access to senior level politicians is no problem anymore. Now it is time for SMEs to use these channels to voice their concern and only that way jobs can be added to the upswing in the economy.

Meeting with AEI president Chris Demuth

The meeting with the President of the American Enterprise Institute was definitely one of the highlights of the whole trip to the US. Mr. Demuth was welcoming us in a very open way and was deeply interested in what we are doing. As many he is concerned about the development Europe is taking today but impressed by the passionate defence of the liberalising force the Internal Market and the Euro by the SG. Of course the battle about which speed and direction to take in economic reform is not decided and by far not won. But it has to be clear that it mainly the member states who block reform and stop the hinder the SMEs of Europe to grow and prosper. Many of the complaints about EU integration are made by government who simple want to hang on to old etatist ways of doling out money and keep corporate welfare as main raison to justify their outrageous levels of taxation. In fact the meeting went well and some follow up can be expected. Mr. Demuth met our President from the EEI side Mr. Peter Jungen already on several occasions and close cooperation can be hoped for.



The AEI is probably the leading research institution of the conservative side of the US think tanks and really strong in economics and foreign affairs.

NSBA meeting with President McCormick

The meeting with President of the NSBA the National Small Business Association has been very interesting because here the level of cooperation with Europe is still low but the interest is really great. The President has been excited about the prospect of finding a homologue on the European level and his organisation would be a perfect match with Ueapme. This falls in the same category of the push towards structural partnership between the two SME governmental agencies on the Union level the SBA on the US side (www.sba.gov) and the DG Enterprise

(www.europa.eu.int/enterprise) or its respective successor DG after 2005 when the new Commission will hopefully establish a new DG for SME in order to serve the new SME Commissioner in his or her tasks. A partnership between the independent SME associations from both sides of the Atlantic would be the perfect way to foster this cooperation and in fact hopefully lead to a stronger SME participation in the Transatlantic Business Dialogue. In many ways the large companies went transatlantic in the 90ies and it is not just an option that the first decade of the 21st will be the decade of SMEs in transatlantic trade. Hopefully the whole cooperation can be kicked off during the EU US summit in 2004.

Visit to C-Spam

A visit to the centre of political television is quite impressive for somebody coming from a supposed political center called Brussels, which has not managed to have anything like that. C-span has just recently started its third channel, C-span 1 for the House of Representatives, Cspan 2 for the Senate and Cspan 3 for general political coverage. That is quite something. It is unbelievable what that means for interaction between the political world and the interested public. Europe with its EBS system for professional news agencies and modest Euro news for the general public is miles (or kilometres if you wish) away from that. Unfortunately the interest on the US side to either broadcast c-span in Europe or to start something like e-span is more than limited. If we need political cable television which brings the public to Europe and opens European institutions for an emerging European public then we probably will have to go the same way like the c-span in the beginning and find international cable TV operators ready to finance a European operation similar in style to c-span. The effect would be tremendous because it would make Europe more responsive and more accountable to the public. A successful initiative in that direction would help Europe more than all

the fuzz about the convention and the constitution. And in any case even contemplating the prospect of a real Union and a real constitution without a political television making Europe accessible at least to the interested public is very close trying modern democra-

cy to undiscovered territory. In a public discussion on this topic Jonathan Faull, the former Commission chief spoke man still ridiculed that EBS is there anyhow and more is fantasy. July 17 Fehlinger's Speech


On the 17th of














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
